From the Director:

Dear Friends of Shem Center,

As another year passes without being able to gather safely, Shem Center continues to maintain a presence in today's world. Our declared mission is a simple one. Promote respect, understanding and friendship among all people of all faiths and spiritual paths, as well as what I call "the spiritually homeless," those feeling disenfranchised from a faith tradition or spiritual path.

This mission has become increasingly challenging as civility, truth telling and ordinary kindness toward each other becomes less and less a part of everyday life. It seems to have gone far beyond the grumpyness we may all be feeling these days. Yet we acknowledge and are grateful for those who serve us as health care providers as well as others we need to function in everyday life. With families and friends separated because of differing views of a disease that has become politicized, a few kind and reassuring words from behind an N95 mask breaks through with a small bit of kindness we may need to get through the day.

A dangerous death dealing covid, now well over 900,000 in the U.S. alone, dictates a necessary distancing to maintain life among adults and children alike. Not surprisingly, those not vaccinated are among the most vulnerable and are a factor in keeping "life as we knew it" from returning. It is becoming increasingly apparent that, "back to normal" is not likely to happen as we create new ways to live going forward.

The Shem Center archives maintained since our beginnings in 1993 reveal an amazing story of travel throughout the country and the many creative retreat experiences we brought with us. A hallmark of Shem Center's work has always been bringing people together using The Dances of Universal Peace with a sacred phrase from one of the world's religions or spiritual paths chanted and danced within a circle — hardly something that is possible on Zoom. How freeing it was not to have to even think about CDC guidelines. Things are different now. Creative ways to use Zoom and other on line technologies are being explored as ways to continue our work.

Aware of the human suffering caused by an unpredictable disease throughout the world,. we are challenged to embrace a much larger world. All humans, and indeed all of creation has been gathered together in an inescapable story of survival. The differences and distinctions that have kept us feeling comfortably separate from one another and from the natural world begins to disappear when life itself is on the line. Covid and the climate crisis is leaving a leveling path of pain in its wake.

Shem Center Vision & Purpose Going Forward

Preparing the Shem Center Annual Report for 2021 offers an opportunity to reflect upon our vision and purpose as we go forward. Given the many changes in our lives due to the pandemic the likelihood that "back to normal" will not be what we long for. The unvaccinated in our own country and throughout the rest of the world will continue to keep us all living in a state of self protection. The degree of preoccupation with being safe from infection will depend upon our own experiences of loved ones who have died or who are permanently affected by the pandemic and the degree of observance of safety measures in place where we live, work and travel. At the time of this writing approximately one million have died from complications due to covid in the USA alone. We have long since passed the level of grief and shock over the 9/11 deaths that numbered 2,977. Denial and numbness seems to be keeping us from acknowledging this reality.

Shem Center's response to this will continue with our message of respect, civility, kindness and inclusiveness. The loss of these qualities in the world today requires our re-commitment to them.

The Shem Center Circle of Respect, a guided meditation that is always used to open any Shem Center gathering establishes the ground upon which we stand as a place where all can expect to be treated with respect even in the midst of disagreement. Anyone can use this simple way to begin a meeting. A written version can be found on the Shem Center web site. Those who use it report meetings that are more engaging and productive. This is true when used with both adults and children.

We plan to continue our programs on Zoom. Male Sprit, the Advent bread baking retreat and the Aramaic words of Jesus retreat will continue to be offered. Spiritual Direction appointments will also continue on Zoom or in Shem Center's back yard, weather permitting.





In January 1992, I attended my first interfaith retreat with Brother Joe. It was a Male Spirit gathering held at the Resurrection Center in Woodstock, Illinois. The following year, the Shem Center was founded and in these intervening years, I have participated regularly in a myriad of programs and offerings (Male Spirit, Circle of Brothers, Bread-Baking, Aramaic Jesus, Dances of Universal Peace, Parliament of World Religions). Participation in Shem Center offerings has allowed me to develop amazing relationships with deeply spiritual people from a wide variety of backgrounds, taught me the value of respectful and practical exploration and dialogue with other faith traditions, and finally, has provided a profound spiritual canvas from which I may continue to imagine and create a world of peace and unity that is the on-going dream of the generations of humankind.

Beyond the programmatic aspects of Shem Center, Joe has become a revered mentor and a lifelong friend. His constant presence in my life has been the precious gift of a faithful guide and companion. When another friend once asked why this connection was so important to me, I replied without thinking, "When I am engaged with Joe and these people, doing this vital work, it is the closest I have ever felt to heaven on earth."

For over 35 years, I have served churches in the United Church of Christ as pastor and teacher. From Iowa to Connecticut to South Dakota, I have been privileged to companion hundreds of dear souls in their exploration of and service to the vision of radical hospitality and inclusive justice that is found in the spirit of Christ. At this point in my life, however, I have begun to grow into what Hindus would call *Vanaprastha* – a time of moving away from social and move from the center of action and leadership into the helping role of elder or advisor. I have just recently become pastor of a much smaller part time church in Jaffrey, New Hampshire. Couple this emerging time and space with my deep love of chant and dance and spiritual exploration and world religions and silence, and I am poised for my next great adventure albeit a slow and quiet path.

It is, therefore, with great excitement and respect, that I accept your offer to become the new assistant director of the Shem Center. I am eager to work beside Joe to continue the amazing work of Shem into the future. I am ready to start as soon as the board decides, and I look forward to working out the practical details of this new position with Joe.



Shem Center's Challenge

Today we face unprecedented challenges that require not only accurate information and truth telling, but also the critical thinking and a commitment to engage in respectful dialogue and courageous action. Not to be engaged in this process is clearly a dangerous choice. Our silence and inaction have consequences that make our overly privatized spiritual journeys obsolete.

Looking back on Shem Center's years of offering retreats throughout the country and other parts of the world, we proclaimed a respectful inclusiveness as



we considered the wisdom of the religions and spiritual paths of the people of the world. Openness to the Divine Presence found in traditions beyond one's own is itself a major breakthrough for many. A simple statement, seldom if ever heard by people has become that aha moment that moves one forward. I simply say, "One does not have to give up anything of one's own religion in order to be blessed and enriched by the religions and spiritual paths of others."

The Creator filled the world with amazing beauty and rich diversity. It is there for us to discover and to receive its blessings.

This appreciation and respect for diversity is key to the dialogue and action that the spiritual journey requires today. Surrounded by dissension and hostility, a respectful exchange with those with whom we may disagree has become nearly impossible. The current thinking is often, "Because you're different from me, you're wrong and therefore an enemy." Our times of prayer, reflection and meditation, practices from which we personally benefit now end with the question, "Now what?" Even the silence we have come to love in our spiritual practice recalls a famous quote from Dr. Martin Luther King, "In the end we will remember not the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends."

Shem Center Annual Gala Concert

person gatherings of past gala concerts. Participation and donations were less than hoped for, and the exchange between performers and audience was greatly missed.

Spiritual Direction

Spiritual Direction, sometimes called "spiritual companioning," is offered at SHEM Center to those interested in deepening their relationship with God within the context of conversation with a director trained and experienced in "the art of holy listening."

While Spiritual Direction may be deeply healing, it is not therapy, a professional relationship focused on resolving psychological problems. Spiritual Direction is instead focused on the spiritual journey by noticing and responding to God who is present in the events of one's life, inner desires and prayer.

The environment is respectful, supportive and confidential. Appointments are usually scheduled on Zoom. In person appointments may also be possible with strict adherence to the most recent CDC guidelines.



Shem Center Financial Report 2021

Fiscal Year 2021


January 1, 2021 to December 31, 2021 The figures in this report represent our financial status during 2021, a year of both challenges and opportunities. You, our faithful and generous friends have helped keep Shem Center solvent and for this we are deeply grateful. Because we have not been renting space in retreat centers for our programs, by far the biggest expense when scheduling retreats, we now ask for a donation from the participant in any amount. Some can give a little while others are able to give more. This arrangement has made it possible for our programs now done on Zoom to be affordable to anyone.

While writing this report Shem Center has had to face an unexpected financial emergency. The cost to us will appear in the 2022 financial report.

Major plumbing and sewer problems, years in the making, made hiring a company qualified to address them necessary. With considerable disruption, dirt and expense the work has been completed. The amount due is well over \$20,000. The complete replacement of a basement restroom that now resembles an archaeological dig, will have to wait until funds are available.

Anyone living in an older house and facing plumbing problems can perhaps tell a similar story. Your tax-deductible donation at this time in any amount will help pay this unexpected bill. Thank you for your generosity.
